PRI reporting is the largest global reporting project on responsible investment. It was developed with investors. for investors.

PRI signatories are required to report publicly on their responsible investment activities each year. In turn, they receive a number of outputs, including a public and private Transparency Report.

The public Transparency Reports, which are produced using signatories' reported information, provide accountability and support signatories to have internal discussions about their practices and to discuss these with their clients, beneficiaries, and other stakeholders.

This public Transparency Report is an export of the signatory's responses to the PRI Reporting Framework during the 2024 reporting period. It includes the signatory's responses to core indicators, as well as responses to plus indicators that the signatory has agreed to make public.

In response to signatory feedback, the PRI has not summarised signatories' responses – the information in this document is presented exactly as it was reported.

For each of the indicators in this document, all options selected by the signatory are presented, including links and qualitative responses. In some indicators, all applicable options are included for additional context.

- What is your organisation's overall approach to responsible investment, and what major responsible investment commitment(s) have you made?

As a global investment manager, MetLife Investment Management (MIM)'s commitment to clients is rooted in our parent MetLife's purpose: "Always with you, building a more confident future." At MIM we believe sustainable investing seeks to deliver competitive risk adjusted market returns by incorporating financially material ESG assessments and stewardship into our investment process. Our sustainable investment approach leverages both our traditional investing and sustainability expertise. We believe that stewardship activities support sustainable investing efforts. Stewardship, in the form of engagement and ongoing dialogue with companies and issuers, helps raise awareness of prudent long term business practices and promotes data transparency and standardization. We believe that capital markets benefit from expanded and improved information from which investment decisions can be made. We are committed to working closely with clients to provide transparency and meet our clients' guidelines and sustainability expectations. As sustainability standards and initiatives in the asset management industry evolve, MIM's approach will continue to develop.

Sustainability is integral to MetLife's business objectives and priorities. MetLife's sustainability strategy supports the Sustainable Development Goals, prioritizing those goals related to reducing inequalities, climate action, good health and well-being, decent work, and economic growth. The Company's broad commitment to sustainability is demonstrated through the security we provide to customers, the claims we pay during times of need, our activities and investments in the communities that we serve, and by making long-term investments in the broader economy. For MIM, we believe that climate change can pose investment risk, and may also offer opportunities across the investments we manage on behalf of our clients. As one example, transition finance is an opportunity to support companies and infrastructure that are likely to emerge as leaders in the transition to a less carbon dependent economy.

We continue to make meaningful progress toward deepening our sustainability expertise and prioritizing data architecture solutions to improve our sustainability-related data and analytics capabilities. Following the acquisition of Affirmative Investment Management (AIM), a specialist impact fixed income investment manager, we have successfully integrated the AIM team into our public and private fixed income teams. MIM and our clients have benefited from their deep capabilities in impact investing, verification, reporting and engagement.

MIM proudly offers an array of fixed income and real estate sustainable investment strategies for those clients whose investment objectives include sustainability focused outcomes. These sustainability strategies are designed to focus on long-term performance and sustainability outcomes, and to the extent applicable, satisfy in-force and impending sustainability regulatory obligations. In 2023, we fortified our sustainability governance framework through the creation of MIM's Sustainable Investment Council (The Council). The Council is a MIM management level group created to provide guidance, advice, and recommendations to support sustainable investing across the platform and makes recommendations to MIM's Management Committee. Stephen Fitzgerald and Fiona Reynolds are also consultants to The Council and provide external sustainability expertise.

Finally, MIM eagerly partners with our clients to develop tailored portfolio solutions that meet their respective investment objectives. As one example, MetLife announced its commitment to be net zero by 2050, applicable to our global operations and general account investment portfolio. As MetLife's general account asset manager, MIM supports MetLife's net zero commitment and has collaborated to develop several interim 2030 net zero targets. We strive to source investment solutions that finance the transition to a less carbon intensive economy for our clients who desire these types of investment opportunities.

MIM has made several improvements to our sustainable investing and stewardship capabilities since our last PRI reporting cycle, most notably our respective refreshed policies released in April 2024. MIM's Sustainable Investment and Stewardship Policies now reflect the incorporation of AIM's capabilities and contributions to our global investment management platform, as well as an updated articulation of our sustainable investment philosophy. Our policy refresh due diligence efforts included industry and peer benchmarking to ensure that appropriate content and a suitable level of disclosures often sought by our clients, regulators, and other stakeholders was included.

In terms of stewardship, our efforts - predominately in the form of engagement - seek to raise awareness and improve data transparency and reporting. MIM engages with issuers, intermediaries, market participants, and policy makers. We engage in a variety of ways, from individual engagements on specific issues, to participating in collective engagement initiatives and hosting thematic engagements on specialist sustainability topics. Earlier this year, MetLife Investment Management Limited (MIML), MIM's UK subsidiary, prepared its inaugural UK Stewardship Code report, with the intent to apply for UK Stewardship Code signatory status. While our UK entity submitted to the Code, the stewardship report covered our wider MIM organization's stewardship activities.

MIM believes that collective engagement benefits the investment community through a more efficient means to build knowledge and encourage standardization of data and reporting. We believe capital markets benefit from more and improved information from which investment decisions can be made. Our collective engagement involvement has generally been conducted to improve sustainability-related data and disclosures. Historically, MIM's primary means to leverage our influence on issuers has been through direct engagement. However, we recognize the shift in perception and practice within the global investment management industry. We acknowledge the importance of the outcome focus of engagement efforts that provide a greater reach to industry-wide knowledge sharing about sustainable investment practices and encourage standardization of sustainability related data and associated disclosures. In 2023, MIM's collective engagement activity served to provide us with a foundation for how to best evaluate participation in like-minded initiatives, as well as to understand the associated resource allocation required to make a meaningful contribution as a participant in these types of efforts going forward. Our collective engagement included participation in 1) Transition Pathway Initiative (TPI) Assessing Sovereign Climate Related Opportunities and Risks (ASCOR) consultation, 2) CDP's Non-Disclosure Campaign, and 3) PRI's Advance stewardship initiative.

MIM recently earned several notable sustainable investment awards and certifications. In 2024, MetLife received the 2024 ENERGY STAR® Partner of the Year Sustained Excellence Award from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). MetLife has been honored as an ENERGY STAR Partner of the Year recipient for six consecutive years and continues to partner with ENERGY STAR on adopting energy-efficient practices and tracking data across all owned and managed properties. In addition to recertifying 32 existing certifications across MetLife and MIM portfolios in 2023, MetLife received new ENERGY STAR Building Certifications for two buildings and MIM certified four new buildings. Additionally, in 2023, MIM and MetLife earned Fitwel Champion status through a joint effort. Fitwel Champion Companies are companies that own, occupy, or manage commercial and residential properties and have committed to using Fitwel at a portfolio scale. And finally, Environmental Finance awarded AIM the Impact Report of the Year at their 2023 Bond Awards and a Sustainable Debt Award in 2024. Annually, Environmental Finance celebrates impact reporting that provides exemplary transparency and measurable impact, and celebrates leading green, social, sustainability and sustainability-linked (GSSS) bond and loan transactions, including significant market participants.

MetLife is currently undertaking an enterprise-wide strategic refresh and all areas of our organization, including MIM, are focused on what we need to prioritize and potentially change to drive growth, returns, and consistency. For MIM, sustainability has been identified as a strategic workstream with a leading priority to build on our organizational structure that can support existing and future, sustainable investing capabilities and strategies. We recognize the importance of having expert staff integrated throughout our organization. We intend to offer ongoing learning and development-focused training to our staff and clients to maintain market leading sustainable investment expertise across all areas of our business, including within our asset classes, legal, compliance, and client engagement teams. Additionally, we will continue our robust engagement with companies and investors.

Sustainability-related data, reporting and analytic capabilities will remain a priority for MIM over the next several years so we can continue to achieve our clients' investment objectives and meet existing and prospective global regulatory requirements. Through our stewardship efforts, we intend to continue to raise awareness and improve data transparency and reporting. As referenced above, ongoing dialogue with companies and issuers helps raise awareness of prudent business practices for the long-term and promotes data transparency and standardization. We believe that capital markets benefit from more and improved information from which investment decisions can be made. We are also focused on fortifying our governance and controls over sustainability data, ensuring that our licensed data vendor and in-house data and reporting solutions align with global sustainability regulatory expectations and client demand.

At MIM, we consider sustainable investing as a core capability. Our focus over the next two years is to build a world leading investment firm that provides excellence in sustainable investing. We believe that focusing on organizational structure, training and development, as well as data and reporting that is client focused will enable us to deliver world class investment management solutions. MIM's client base is diverse, and we recognize that clients' investment objectives vary. This is why it is important to offer a range of investment solutions to meet our clients where they are on their sustainable investing journey.

MIM has taken steps to integrate climate-related pecuniary risks and opportunities into our investment strategy, planning and products. We have a sustainability research team that works closely with our credit research team and reports to our global Head of Credit Research. Our research teams examine the GHG emission profile, decarbonization targets, and financial profile of credit issuers, in order to develop a careful assessment of the issuer's balance sheet health, operational profile, and any potential risks or opportunities posed by the energy transition. Moreover, our teams monitor issuers' progress towards these goals over time. We have also taken steps to connect sustainability data with portfolio data, utilizing GHG emissions and climate data in our portfolio software. In partnership with clients who have set net zero targets, we are preparing to follow in accordance with the EU's SFDR regulation for applicable funds. Additionally, for real estate equity and debt investments we analyze both the physical and transition risk from climate change. For equity assets that pose high risk in either category we estimate the impact to cash flow and value and, how to mitigate that risk, if possible. For our residential whole loan AUM, we assess perils risk for under-insured losses that could be taken.

As one example, as a responsible real estate investor, we believe financially material environmental, social and governance (ESG) factors can have an impact on investment performance and are important considerations to effectively manage risk and achieve our clients' investment objectives. ESG factors have gained traction over the past decade with more investment management firms integrating sustainability or decarbonization strategies into short- and long-term planning. At MIM our bottom-up credit culture seeks to identify companies, projects and real estate that are sustainable over the long term. As ESG factors have moved to the forefront of the investment conversation, MIM continually renews our focus on sustainability practices that have been at the core of our risk management-focused investment processes.

(2) Describe how this process is integrated into your overall risk management

MIM's approach to sustainable investment begins with an assessment of financially material risks and opportunities as part of our fundamental, disciplined due diligence and monitoring processes. ESG factors and insights, along with traditional investment risk and opportunity assessments, are incorporated in a manner consistent with our asset classes and sustainability strategies, as are deemed relevant and applicable. MIM's asset teams utilize the IFRS Sustainability Alliance's SASB sector-specific materiality matrix to help identify potentially financially material ESG-related risks and opportunities.

As one example, MetLife is supporting and financing solutions in the real estate sector that help manage risk, drive progress toward a low-carbon economy and create sustainable investment returns and outcomes. MetLife's 2030 target to reduce GHG emissions associated with its real estate equity investments by 50% from 2019 baseline on our path to Net Zero is a continuation of this strong track record. To reduce emissions, MIM focuses on energy reduction and efficiency strategies, procurement of on-site and off-site renewables and ongoing dialogue with stakeholders across the properties it owns and controls. Between 2019 and 2022, financed emissions for MetLife's GA real estate equity investments have declined by 11%. MIM is also a signatory of the Department of Energy's (DOE) Better Buildings Challenge and Better Climate Challenge and the Urban Land Institute's Greenprint Net Zero Framework. MetZero™ is MIM's approach to systematically lower carbon emissions in the real estate properties we invest in and the properties under our operational control, including on behalf of MetLife and third-party clients. Between 2016 and 2022, this approach helped MIM achieve an 8% reduction in portfolio energy intensity according to the Better Buildings Challenge.

MIM's investment teams aim to deliver strong, risk-adjusted returns by building tailored portfolio solutions for our clients across our core asset teams including public fixed income, private capital, and real estate. As a result, our investment analysts, asset originators, and portfolio managers are tasked with building and managing resilient investment portfolios. These responsibilities can include incorporating financially material ESG assessments into our risk management focused investment processes, as well as offering strategies for, and knowledge sharing with, those clients who have defined sustainability objectives.

We have also begun considering life cycle cost analysis for building materials. We pursue GRESB standards for several of our funds and all of our assets are benchmarked for energy, water, and waste in Energy Star's Portfolio Manager tool. We report to the Department of Energy's Better Building Challenge, where data is publicly disclosed, as well as reporting to the ULI Greenprint Center. Efforts are ongoing throughout the year to ensure data quality and accuracy. Various tasks are coordinated by our internal staff, as well as by our third-part architects, engineers, and/or consultants.
